

The Sixties were shuddering to an exhausted close when I landed in Atlanta at the hot end of summer, 1969. I was part of a generation marked by endless assassinations and a war that we didn't have a language to describe even as we were being sent off to die in it. Wary of politicians, we took refuge in the poets and the prophets, trusting only the music and each other. We believed desperately in the possibility of love and the inevitability of freedom. We turned our car radios up loud so we could sing along with Sly and the Family Stone, not realizing that at the very same moment Maynard Jackson was getting ready to change our lives forever.

Of course, I didn't know it when I turned on the news one night, and there he was. He was one of several candidates for vice mayor and even all these years later, I still can't describe the impact of seeing him for the first time. It wasn't just what he said, it was his passionate energy that made it impossible for me to look away. I believed in what he was saying, but I also believed in him. He seemed to be the kind of leader I had given up hope of ever finding again. I couldn't take my eyes off of him.

I hadn't been here long enough to vote, but everybody I met was already talking about how he was going to be elected mayor when the next election rolled around in four years, so I knew I'd have another chance. And I did. I volunteered as a speechwriter for his 1973 campaign and celebrated his victory by following him into City Hall for two years as his Director of Communications.

It is not hyperbole to say that my association with Maynard Jackson changed my life. He was the most demanding, intimidating, infuriating boss I ever had, but he allowed me to be a part of a truly transformational Atlanta moment. He taught me how to love the city and its people as much as he did. And I do.

For those of us who were there, way back in 1974, it's hard to believe it's been 50 years since we sent him to City Hall as our first African American mayor. It's hard to remember how young and hopeful we were. I think it's the memory of our hopefulness that made me want to write this play. I wanted to revisit a moment as The Witness says, "when all things were possible and our town's future stretched out before us like the yellow brick road that danced Dorothy all the way to Oz." A moment when a shell-shocked child of the sixties could ease on down that road and discover her dreams right there waiting. I am forever grateful. Think of this as a love letter.

SOMETHING MOVING, A LOVE LETTER

Pearl Cleage Portrays the Beauty of Atlanta Through Reflections on Maynard Jackson

n the simplest of terms, *Something Moving: A Meditation on Maynard* explores the historic election of Maynard Jackson, Atlanta's first Black mayor. But quite honestly, it's about much more.

"Maynard changed my life," says Pearl Cleage, the Alliance Theatre's Artist-in-Residence and playwright of *Something Moving*. "I had been raised in a radical, Black Nationalist family and went to Howard University in the mid 60s when we were protesting everything. When I came to Atlanta in 1969, Maynard was running for vice mayor."

She happened to see him on television and thought he was incredible.

"He was saying all the things I wanted a politician to say. Just a big charismatic presence," she remembers, adding that she asked the person sitting next to her at the time, "Who is that guy?"

Their response?

"'Oh, he's going to be the mayor!' There was such a feeling that he was going to move everything we had fought so hard for forward," Cleage says. "We all understood how lucky we were to have somebody like that 'moving things' forward. He was so in love with this city and that love exuded in every single thing that he did."

In that moment, she decided she would keep her eyes and ears open to everything he did. And she did.

"I'm sure I broke all journalistic objective rules," she says.

When he launched his campaign for mayor, Cleage, who was producing a public affairs show for one of the local television stations, offered to write him a campaign speech. The speech led to her becoming the campaign's press secretary. Her time as the campaign's press secretary led to her becoming the Director of Communications for two years during his time in City Hall.

From that vantage point, as a member of Jackson's inner circle, Cleage wrote *Something Moving*.

Because of Maynard, she not only learned Atlanta but learned to love Atlanta.

"I learned to love Atlanta the way he loved Atlanta," she says. "Which is through the people. To be right there when people are mad that their trash didn't get picked up, or the water wasn't on, or whatever it is. These are not big philosophical issues to people, but part of people's daily lives. It was exhausting and exhilarating, and life changing and life affirming because you knew the work you were doing meant something."

Cleage sets the play in present-day Atlanta. Through the voices of nine characters representing a diverse mix of identities called Citizens, audiences are taken back to that time 50 years ago. In thinking about these citizens, it was important to her that they represent Atlanta. It is 2024, not 1973, after all.

"By casting Black folks and white folks, Asian people and Latinos and Native Americans, and all of the people who are part of that story, even if they're not lifted up every time, we can see that the community we're talking about isn't just a small community," she says. "It's a big community. It's what Atlanta looks like now. And Atlanta right now looks like America."

We tend to think of Atlanta still in terms of Black and white, says Cleage, but Atlanta is such a diverse place.

"We talk so often about Black and white, Black and white, because we're in the deep South. We're in a former slave state, and we've never really dealt with that as a state," she says. "We haven't really settled all of those issues, which is evident even today in the modern political discourse."

She thinks of when apartheid ended in South Africa. As part of their move forward, the country organized truth and reconciliation commissions where citizens would have open dialogue about the effect of apartheid on society. The conversations were not had just with the victims, but the perpetrators as well.

"Bishop Desmond Tutu, who was a big force behind the reconciliation commissions, would say, 'We can't move forward until we find a language to talk about the past, so we can sit in a room with each other,'" says Cleage.

That's why, as a writer, she is so fascinated with the power of language. She watched her father, as a very charismatic minister, use language to move people and help them understand very sophisticated concepts while also moving them emotionally. That's what she's always trying to do in her plays — make the ideas resonate but resonate in a way that everybody can understand it.

"That's what I want. I want us to feel that way, and I want everybody who comes in to feel that way, you know? I want everyone to feel that we are a thing of beauty — as flawed and crazy as we are as human beings — we really are a thing of beauty and infinite possibilities. And if we get together, it's just incredible what we can do."

There's an exchange in the play where one of the citizens says early on, "Well, wait a minute now, this is the Mayor Jackson story, right?" And another character, known as The Witness, says, "Well, not really, you know, we start with him and all that, but it's really about...it's not *about* him." The woman responds, "Well, what is it about?" And The Witness says, "It's about you. It's about me. It's about us."

That's why, at its core, *Something Moving* is a love letter to Atlanta. Cleage hopes this play does that as well — allow people to say, we — as in the City of Atlanta and its inhabitants — are more beautiful than we thought we were.

"That's exactly what it is," says Cleage. "A love letter is supposed to not only make you think about the beloved, but also see how that person sees you. When we receive one, we are like, 'Wow, he's writing me a letter like this or she's writing me a letter like this. That means that I must look better than I thought I looked.' If someone can see all that in me, I must be okay."

Kajese-Bolden honed her directing and producing skills as a freelance director working in regional houses across the country and on set. As a director and actor, she fosters deep ongoing collaborations with playwrights and has mounted innovative and critically acclaimed productions that merge elegant, theatrical designs with complicated human stories. A Princess Grace Award 2019 Winner for Directing and Map Fund Award recipient as a director and actor, she has worked on and Off-Broadway as well as recurring roles in the Marvel universe "Guardians of the Galaxy: Holiday Special," Suicide Squad, "Hawkeye," and CW's "Valor," "Dynasty," HBO's "Henrietta Lacks," Ava Duverney's "Cherish the Day," among others. Up next, she is developing a new Opera, Forsythe is Flooding: The Joy of Lake Lanier, and proudly serves on the ARTS-ATL Artist Advisory Council. "My mission is the pursuit of what connects our different communities and how we create art that liberates us to imagine a more inclusive future."

CHRISTOPHER MOSES (Jennings Hertz Artistic Director) has been working in professional theatre for twenty years and in 2022 was awarded the Governor's Award for Arts in Humanities for his body of work. Since taking over this position, Chris has expanded the reach

and impact by making the Alliance Theatre Education department a vital resource for advancing the civic agenda of Atlanta. This work is accomplished through deep and sustained partnerships with social service organizations throughout the city. Under his leadership, the Alliance launched its Kathy & Ken Bernhardt Theatre for the Very Young program, which provides fully interactive professional theater experiences for children of all abilities from ages newborn through five years old; the Alliance Teen Ensemble, which performs world premiere plays commissioned for and about teens; the Palefsky Collision Project, where teens produce a new work after colliding with a classic text; expanded the Alliance's summer camp program to include over 3,000 children in multiple locations across Atlanta: and Alliance@ work, a professional development program designed for the business sector — the latest offering of which uses theatre practice to create a culture of civility in the workplace. In 2014. Chris added the title Associate Artistic Director and has continued to expand the Alliance's education offerings. During his tenure in this position, the Alliance has produced over a dozen world premiere plays for young audiences, including Pancakes, Pancakes! by Ken Lin, The Dancing Granny by Jireh Breon Holder, Max Makes a Million by Liz Diamond, and The Incredible Book Eating Boy by Madhuri Shekar. Currently. the Alliance serves over 100,000 students pre-k-12 each season, as well as over 4.000 adults through its extensive education offerings. In 2023, he was named Artistic Director of the Alliance Theatre.

MIKE SCHLEIFER (Managing Director) joined the Alliance Theatre in 2014 as the General Manager and in 2016, assumed the role of Managing Director. During his time at the Alliance, Mike has led the administrative and producing team on over 100 productions including bringing Tuck Everlasting and The Prom to Broadway. He was one of the architects of the "On the Road" season while a multi-million dollar renovation of the Coca-Cola Stage was underway. Mike is excited to have started the Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Committee at the Alliance and to serve on the board of the League of Resident Theatres and True Colors Theatre Company. Prior to Atlanta, he spent 13 years at Baltimore's Center Stage working in several roles including Associate Producer, Production Manager and Resident Stage Manager. While in

Baltimore, Mike was an adjunct faculty member at Towson University and has guest-lectured all over the country. Mike began as a Stage Manager and has dozens of stage management credits between his time in New York and working regionally.
